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Executive Minister's Report

TABCOM 2024 Financial Highlights

TABCOM experienced a strong financial year during 2024. TABCOM ended the fiscal year with a \$22,000 surplus. Overall revenues remain strong resulting from consistently good returns in the stock market. We have noted a decline in donations from member churches as pressure on their cash flows increase with higher costs and lower attendance. TABCOM is blessed to have diversity in its revenue streams of offset a downturn in historical revenue sources. Our operating expense remains in good control. Most of the operating expenses are payroll related. However, there are opportunities to reduce costs going forward in the areas of utilities, insurance and office related expenses.

The Property Fund, TABCOM's primary asset to fund general operating costs, continued to grow in value. The Property Fund's yearend balance has increased to \$5.7M and based on a planned 4% distribution rate, the fund will provide approximately \$220,000 per year towards TABCOM's future operating costs. The Transformation fund had a yearend balance of \$1.1 million. In early 2025 the fund received a very generous gift from the late Ralph Earle which has nearly doubled the fund balance and going forward the fund will provide TABCOM and the camps with an annual distribution of \$80,000. Donations from our member churches, although under financial pressure, remain a critical funding source for TABCOM. In 2024, TABCOM received approximately \$150,000 in member church donations. Lastly, private donations have become an important means of funding special projects within TABCOM. Ed Guerard, who championed this effort over the years, developed key relationships with individuals looking to donate to both TABCOM and the camps. Sadly, Ed passed away recently, and TABCOM is actively looking to fill this important position and continue Ed's legacy forward.

Lastly, during 2024 TABCOM was able to provide significant grants to numerous member churches from donated funds and returns on assets managed directly and indirectly by TABCOM such as the Charlestown and Elder Ministry funds.

I would like to acknowledge Richard Wolf's many years of service as TABCOM's Director of Finance. Richard will continue as the Chair of a newly established Investment Committee. Richard will ensure our funds are invested properly to provide adequate cash flow to TABCOM on an annual basis while also generating long-term growth in our portfolios. It is truly an honor to replace Richard, and I hope I can continue his work into the future.





Retreats Ministry

Grotonwood Retreat Center is huge asset to Christian groups as a place for spiritual growth. We strive to improve the experience these groups have by continuing to increase the quality of service, our facilities and food. The number of guests who attend continues to grow, but we are "playing Tetris" with our accommodation and meeting spaces. We have the demand to serve more groups, however more accommodation space is needed. The cost for building such a space would be in the region of \$5m, which we do not have. Is anyone in the TABCOM community able to make this possible?

Camping Ministry

Our camping program, the one facet in which we get to directly provide spiritual nourishment to our campers and staff, again surpassed what we could ever have imagined. Our Bible themed "Stories from the Sea" underpinned the worship, message and activities our camper engaged with throughout the season.

New activities added in 2024 included a brand new low ropes course in Pioneer Village, remote controlled cars, an air-soft target range, wheelchair ramp for the picnic stage, a new jet boat, new Gaga pit and a new swim dock for the beach.

We have seen an increase in demand for our specialist camps such as our 1:1 ratio Day Camp program and Adults with Disabilities program. To help support this demand we will be extending our summer camp program from eight to nine weeks in 2025. We had the highest recorded income ever for a fourth year in a row. This means that more campers attended Grotonwood in 2024 vs any electronically recorded summer (which goes back to 2011).

- † Smart thermostats have been installed in all Judson cabins.
- † Prescott Lodge has been completely painted inside.
- † New kitchen area added to Prescott Lodge

† Pine Lodge has been demolished

Pavilion Update

Thank you for all your support in raising funds for the Pavilion, which will replace Pine Lodge. We have almost raised enough money to complete the whole building. We have paid for Pine (Health) Lodge to be demolished. The cost for this did come in a little higher, as a number of unexpected requirements were needed, such as a pest control plan and asbestos was found in some of the flooring tiles. With the building and foundation removed and the ground leveled we are close to getting ready to install the slab. We are currently waiting for the architect to redraw the front elevation and for the engineer to recalculate the snow load. Once we have this we should be able to gain the permit to start work.

Staffing Updates

Linda left our kitchen to manage the one at Oceanwood. She's missed, but we're really excited for her to help support the retreats happening there.

Lesley-Ann has been hired as our new Office Manager. She brings lots of HR and process experience with her from FedEX and is a wonderful woman of Christ.

Thank you to all our supporters who volunteered their time or contributed towards our capital improvements or campership fund. We couldn't do all that we do without your faithful prayers, financial contributions and the gift of your time.

Missions Ministry Annual Report

2024 was my first full year as the Director of Missions—the role I took on in late June of 2023. And it was a year of discernment. As the new year of 2024 rolled in with greetings from the Global Servants of the IM (International Ministries/American Baptist Foreign Mission Societies), including those who were the guests at TABCOM MissionWorks 2023, those serving at American Baptist Home Mission Societies and other ABCUSA affiliated organizations, those from other mission and Christian non-profit organizations, and numerous others ordained and lay ministers of Christ serving at local churches, I was reminded and convinced anew that God was indeed at work everywhere through all these servants of His—all followers of Christ whom our Lord Christ Jesus sent out as the Father had sent him. Indeed, Christianity is a "sending" religion, as one prominent Christian Mission scholar put it—needless to say that the word "mission" comes from the biblical Greek words for "sending."

In particular, it has been the "foot soldiers" of Christ, the faithful servants of Christ on the front lines of ministry, whether they are professional "missionaries" or volunteer ministers/servants, whether they have a formal title or role, who bore witness to Christ to the local people as they carried on the works of Christ in their day-to-day, face-to-face services to others, embodying the love of Christ. The faithfulness of these fellow Christian brothers and sisters was palpable at every church I visited and at every "mission" and outreach event that I was part of—such as at the mission training at Morning Star Baptist Church, Jasmine Outreach, ECG Outreach, WIT Outreach, New England Missions Network gathering, Global Encounter and Reach the Nations events, to name a few. As the Director of Missions, I have had occasions to meet and talk with scholars and professors in the field of Christian mission. When I asked what is most needed in Christian mission now, one prominent scholar of missiology and Chrisitan history said that it is the ministers/servants of Christ serving others in the world, thus carrying on the works of Christ.

It is almost cliché to say that Christian mission is from everyone to everywhere. One needs not be a "Global Servant" or "missionary" serving in the global-South or -East, though such servants of Christ are in great demand in those regions. But what is also needed is local servants of Christ ministering at local foodbanks, homeless shelters, temporary housing facilities for refugees and immigrants, safehouses for exploited women and victims of

domestic violence, prisons, and other such places in the shadow of society in our own town, city, and State. What is needed is for us to look beyond our own natural boundaries, such as racial, ethnic, and cultural boundaries, and comfort zones for the mission of God.

It was with all these in mind that the theme of TABCOM MissionWorks 2024 was set: *Crossing Boundaries: Intercultural Ministries in the Mission of God.* It was apropos since MA has seen a significant increase in diversity since 2010, with the minority population growing faster than the national average. In 2020, the Diversity index was 61%, meaning that 61% of MA residents were part of a racial or ethnic minority. Meanwhile, only 52% of adults in MA identify themselves as Christians according to a recent Pew Research data. Indeed the harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. May the Lord of the harvest send out workers into His harvest field, even right here in MA.

This also became a way to make them aware of various events in the region that could help them and their churches.

At our September meeting we were pleased to be able to vote in, unanimously, a new member church: Lively Stones Christian Center of Brockton. They were present with us that day and received a warm welcome from the churches present.

Portuguese Liaison Annual Report

TABCOM'S LIAISON TO THE EXECUTIVE MINISTER FOR THE PORTUGUESE-SPEAKING COMMUNITY

It is a privilege to serve the Lord and each other in the name of Christ. As we do that it's a blessing to be able to look back, from time to time, to see what the Lord has done in our lives, our families, and our ministries.

As part of TABCOM's Brazilian Community (also known as Portuguese-Speaking Community), we look back with gratitude for what the Lord did and allowed us to do in his name in the past year, no matter how small such things could seem to be at times. Everything we're able to do for Him, enabled by Him, brings Him glory.

Here is a small list of some activities that took place within the Brazilian community and denominational events that somehow involved its members. I want to express my gratitude to my colleagues Rev. Jackson Oliveira and Rev. Miguel R. daSilva for helping me to put this list together. I anticipate my apologies in case any imprecision would be found in it.

- 1. We had a meeting for Brazilians during the 2024 Annual Meeting.
- 2. There was a virtual meeting in June with a number of pastors.
- 3. On June 15 there was a special service for the Brazilian churches at the New Life Baptist Church (Igreja Batista Nova Vida) in Lowell.
- 4. Several members of the Brazilian Community, pastors and lay leaders, participated in the MBMM Allelon Gathering last September, promoted by MBMM with the support of ABHMS.
- 5. On September 29 the ABC Latin Ministries Coordinator, Rev. Abner Coto-Bonilla, preached at the Brazilian church Igreja Baptista Renovada (Renewed Baptist Church) of Pastor Jackson Oliveira in Acton.
- 6. On October 5, Brazilians met at the church of Pastor Ronie Souza in Lowell to celebrate the church's anniversary.
- 7. On November 16 some members of our community participated in a Brazilian Caucus virtual meeting.
- 8. The church Igreja Batista Vida Nova, under the leadership of Pastor Ronie Souza, was received by TABCOM as a member. Pastor Jackson and I took part of the process, providing assistance to both sides.
- 9. There was a virtual meeting of the Brazilian Caucus and its representatives last February.

It is good to see our community coming back to life after the limitations imposed by the pandemic and its aftermath. It seems that the dry land crossing is over. Let's keep on praying and expecting great things from God.

Samuel Stillman Annual Report

Christ is with us. As churches and as an association, we support each other in remembering Christ's presence and power, even in the current storm. We help each other to move forward with open eyes, seeing that, though we are all in the storm, we are not all the same, and we do not all experience the storm in the same way. Consider, for example, immigrant churches facing unprecedented pressure now. Even as Christ sees us, let us pray that we can see each other. Even as Christ expressed his love through washing his disciples' feet (John 13:1-15), let us, as churches and as an association, wash each other's feet, and reach out to others to wash feet, as a palpable, mutual expressions of God's love.

There is a hymn that emerged in the 1960s that expresses this mutuality well. It is called "They'll know we are Christians by our love." The song was written by a Catholic priest, Peter Scholtes, who served a church on the South Side of Chicago. According to Hymnary.org (https://hymnary.org/text/we are one in the spirit), "At the time, he was leading a youth choir out of the church basement and was looking for an appropriate song for a series of ecumenical, interracial events. When he couldn't find such a song, he wrote the now-famous hymn in a single day." Similarly, let us pray for Holy Spiritinspired creative resilience to help our Christian unity when the well seems dry.

In my role as Association Resource Coordinator of the Samuel Stillman Association I act as a liaison between TABCOM, the Stillman Association, and its more than 30 churches in and around Boston, including urban and suburban and many different languages. I act as an encourager of the association itself, in all its functions, trying to ensure that things do not fall through the cracks. I pray for the churches; preach when asked; consult to pastors, laypeople, and pastoral search committees when asked; counsel candidates for ordination; and engage people in working together across boundaries. I also share news from TABCOM and ABCUSA with the Stillman Association and share Stillman concerns with TABCOM administration.

Here are some updates:

† Current Stillman Association officers include Rev. John Odams, moderator; Deb Mel, treasurer; Cathy Zeman, clerk; Rev. Jason Rutherford, Chair of Ordination Committee; Rev. Xinyu Li, Chair of Nominations Committee; and two members at large, Earl Norman and Deborah Porter.

- † An ad hoc committee of the Executive Committee is working together to get the Stillman Website restored.
- † Last summer Trinity Baptist Church in Arlington hosted the Stillman Association for its annual picnic and annual meeting. We hope to return this summer.
- † In December Rev. Xinyu Li invited the Association to his church, Lincoln Park, Newton, for a Chinese Christmas Concert. This served as the fall gathering of the Stillman Association.
- † This year, C.J. Fowler (Old Cambridge Baptist Church) and Erik Nordbye (International Community Church) were ordained to Christian ministry. Rev. Fowler is serving as the Minister with Children and Families at Second Baptist Church in Little Rock, Arkansas. Rev. Nordbye is soon to be installed as pastor at International Community Church.
- † The Monthly meeting of Stillman Pastors, begun last year, will soon recommence, hosted by Rev. Patrick McCorkle at First Baptist Arlington.
- † Two churches called new pastors: Old Cambridge Baptist Church called Rev. Sarah Lusche, and Union Church of Waban, a TABCOM cousin church, called Rev. Megan Berkowitz.
- Three churches are in various points in search and call: Trinity Baptist in Arlington is using supply pastors from TABCOM, First Baptist Framingham, is served by interim Rev. Jerrie Shepard Matney, and Union Baptist Church in Cambridge is very close to calling a pastor. At Union, the ministry staff and various guest preachers cover the pulpit. Prayer ministry, led by Min. Debra Mosley, meets three times a week and Rev. Loretta continues to lead weekly Bible Study on Zoom.

As might be clear here, I am experiencing a Kum Bah Ya moment. Kum Bah Ya means Come by here. God, we need you. Come by here.

MABIT has provided a proven investment service for TABCOM churches and partners allowing them to pool investment funds for 30 years. The pooling of funds allows for upgraded financial management services and reduced management fees. MABIT offers three investment categories: Growth, Moderate and Conservative. Approximately 30 Massachusetts Baptist churches and TABCOM partners invest via MABIT. MABIT's balance is in excess of \$8M.

MABIT is partnered with Merrill Lynch's Barcomb, Tanguay and Associates to provide professional fiduciary management services. The MABIT Board of Trustees meets with the Barcomb/Tanguay advisors three times per year to review the overall portfolio, MABIT product offerings and discuss market issues. Socially responsible screening of investments is performed for all accounts. Each investing church has complete control over its account's asset allocation.

The 2024 financial markets continued to bounce back from the tough losses in 2022. The bond market has been slow to recover from its record breaking loss of 18.5% in 2022. The bond market is expected to improve in 2025. The equity markets performed well in 2024. 2024 ended with MABIT's highest portfolio balance with a \$2M gain in the past two years. The overall portfolio gained 12.25% in 2024. A new contractor, PG Calc, was hired to improve sub accounting and reporting services.

The Board continues to advise investors to annually review their risks. Individual accounts will be rebalanced quarterly with the new PG Calc services. The Board also recommends the Moderate investment option with a 60% equity and 40% fixed portfolio for most investors. Barcomb advisors are available to assist you.

The Board is very pleased to announce that Nelda Cronin of Chelmsford's First Baptist Church has joined MABIT's Board of Trustees.
